### **Services for Holy Week and Easter 2021**

The services for Holy Week and Easter are outlined below. Palm Crosses will be given out at the beginning of the Palm Sunday Holy Communion, we are also hoping to deliver some around the parish. If you would like to receive a cross please contact Debs or one of the ministry team, alternatively you may like to collect one from the back of church during the week.

From Monday to Wednesday, at 9am in Lady St Mary church, there will be a Book of Common Prayer Holy Communion service, including an extended reading from the passion accounts of Mark and Luke.

On Maundy Thursday evening at 7.00pm, in Lady St Mary church, there will a Common Worship Holy Communion remembering the institution of the Lord's supper. At the end of this service the church will be stripped of all ornamentation and decoration, ready for the austerity and solemnity of Good Friday. This will be followed by a time of vigil (optional), during which Stainer's crucifixion will be played.

Normally on Good Friday we would hold a three-hour service of reflection in Lady St Mary church, but due to the current restrictions we will be holding just 'The Final Hour' in which there will be three reflections on the Silence, Suffering and Solitude of the Cross. This starts at 2pm. A version of this service will also be available on YouTube, on the Wareham's Church of England Family channel.

On Easter Day there will be a Dawn Holy Communion service, outside at East Holme Priory, starting at 6.30am. Then there will be Easter Communions at Sandford St Martin church, at 9.30am (also available on Zoom); Lady St Mary church and St John the Evangelist, East Holme, both at 10.00am. To round things off, there is an all-age Easter celebration in the school field at Sandford St Martin school, starting at 4.00pm.

All are welcome to our church services but please remember to bring your masks, and remember that social distancing rules apply in church. However, if you are still isolating you will be able to follow our services on YouTube and/or Zoom.

# If you go down to the church today you may get a big surprise!

By now – weather permitting – there will be a bright vellow banner across the front of the church above the door that says "back the climate and ecological emergency bill." This is a bill that was put before Parliament last September and is an attempt to encourage our government to actually fulfil the promises





that they have already made in respect of taking care of the Earth that we as Christians believe that God made and gave to us to look after.

The banner, which hopefully will be there until the end of Sunday, is a statement that our church believes taking care of the natural environment not only matters but is an integral part of the expression of our Christian faith. This is not us saying that we've got it right by any stretch of the imagination; as a church we are right at the beginning of trying to get our ecological house in order through our commitment to "eco-church."

All over the country churches and other organisations are putting up similar banners this weekend. The idea is to raise the profile of the conversation: to take pictures of it, possibly pictures of yourself with it, and to send those pictures to your MP, to social media, or any other ways that you have of sharing the message that not only do we want our government to do all that they can to protect our planet, but that as Christians we see creation care as part of our faith and are committed to doing what we can to show that through our actions and our prayer and worship.

Simon said "Having looked at the environmental crisis affecting our world in our parish Lent course this year, it seems only right to keep highlighting the issues and then actively pursing the agenda for change. If our banner highlighting the Climate and Ecological Emergency Bill can make people think, it can hopefully encourage them to change and to seek change in our nation and around the world. Let us pray this is so".

# **Families Zooming Together!**

One of the challenges during lockdown has been how to stay connected with the young families who are part of our Angel Voices and Breakfast@9 communities. Services with social distancing, no singing, and little interaction between different households, are difficult for children, especially younger ones.



So we have had to be creative and think differently! Over the last couple of months, we have held two Sunday afternoon online Zoom gatherings for families. On both occasions, we delivered activity bags for each child to their homes beforehand, containing all the things they needed to join in with an activity on Zoom. In early February, this took the form of a Zoom Christingle to celebrate Candlemas, with Hilary Bond leading the children through the process of making their Christingles live on Zoom. Then in early March, our theme was preparing for Mothering Sunday, led by Helen Williams, with the children making gift boxes to give to mums and other family members. On both occasions, we heard a Bible story, sung songs of worship, and prayed together.

Of course, we look forward to the time when things like this can be done in person once again, but during the current restrictions these Zoom gatherings have been a really important way of staying connected. They have been fun, joyful and prayerful, and we have received lots of great feedback from the families. Watch this space for plans for future events!

## A New Sermon Series - The 'I Am" sayings of Jesus

The Times newspaper once wrote to eminent writers and thinkers asking them what was wrong with the world. The author G.K. Chesterton came back with the most succinct and honest answer, simply replying, 'I am'. But what if the question had asked what the solution was to humanity's problem there is only one person in the whole of history who could answer, 'I am' and that was Jesus.

Throughout John's Gospel we have seven occasions when Jesus asserts "I am...". Taking the divine name revealed to Moses at the burning bush (Ex3:14), Jesus makes it his own by applying it to different facets of his life and calling. Thus, he establishes himself as the divine Son of God, the light and life of all people.

Starting on Easter day, with 'I am the resurrection and the life' we shall be exploring in our weekly sermons the 'I am' saying of Jesus and learning what they reveal to us about his humanity and deity, and how that impacts on our lives.

A little boy was playing outside with his mother's broom in the garden. That night his mother realised her broom was still missing and asked her son to go out and bring it in.


When the little boy confessed he was afraid of the dark, his mother tried to comfort him: 'The Lord is out there too, don't be afraid.'
